## Bowl buddies with tales galore hit S.D.

They're wise-cracking fans for hire, two Midwest fraternity brothers at the University of Kansas in the early 1980s who caught a bowl game bug they couldn't shake.

On Jan. 1, 1984, Tom Hall and Brian Dixon attended the Sugar Bowl. Then they went to another bowl... and another... and another. The Poinsettia Bowl will be the 37th they've attended in 34 years.

If you see them, they'll unabashedly hit you up for a ticket, a beer — or both.

"The entrepreneurial spirit," Dixon called it.

They've witnessed the last gasp of the Bluebonnet

in 1987, Seattle's sayonara in 2002, the Silicon Valley crash of 2004. They've experienced the births of seven others.

They've slipped into luncheons and VIP tents with the skill of Cold War-era operatives. Job-related travel — Hall owns a parts company in Kansas City; Dixon works in sales in Denver — allows the pair to use points and frequent flyer miles to cover flights and hotels.

Mainly, they've maintained a dusty friendship thanks to college football despite lives scattered across different time zones.

## COWBOYS' PATIENCE PAYS OFF BIG TIME

Turnaround at Wyoming was very welcomed

Wyoming football fans didn't go looking for a rope to string up the coach after last year's 2-10 finish.

Probably because, being cowboys, they already knew where one was if they really wanted it.

Patience isn't what it used to be, even out on the prairie, so Wyoming's turnaround this season was welcome in more ways than one.

"It's been gratifying to go through it and say, 'We didn't divert from our plan,' said Wyoming coach Craig Bohl, who was given a little more rope because of a résumé that included three national championships at North Dakota State before coming to Laramie three years ago.

perform at quarterback for the Cougars. This will be his first start of the season after Taysom Hill suffered a season-ending elbow injury. But the 23-year-old Mangum, only a sophomore, has plenty of experience. He played in all 13 games last season, threw for more than 3,300 yards and

some misfortune here, too. In the 1989 Holiday Bowl, Detmer threw for a single-game bowl record 576 yards, though BYU lost to Penn State 50-39. The following year, when he won the Heisman, the Cougars were routed 65-14 by Texas A&M in the Holiday Bowl and

FROM D1 the bowl games, and this is our way of keeping this friendship together," said Hall, 56. "How many people have lost that great friend from college or high school just because they didn't make a commitment?"

The plan germinated during the third quarter of Auburn's 9-7 win against Michigan in '84 as Bo Jackson ran over Wolverines defenders and Al Del Greco kicked three field goals.

At the time, 18 bowl games existed. Hit 'em all. Easy enough, right?

"We didn't realize the landscape would change so much and the bowls would mushroom," said Dixon, 57. "At the end of the Micon PC Bowl in 2000, we had five left. Sixteen years later, having gone to 17 (more) bowl games, we now have eight left.

"The math just doesn't

seem fair."

The friends bought tickets outside the Rose Bowl in 1990, when USC beat Michigan in Bo Schembechler's final game. At the gate, the tickets were identified as stolen from Michigan's ticket office.

The men talked themselves into the game anyway because, well, that's what they do. They vowed to test

their sales skills to avoid buying tickets again. The closest they've come to reaching for billfolds was at the sold-out Pinstripe Bowl in 2014.

"New York's not the kind of place where people are exactly giving away free stuff," Hall said. "A guy asked Brian how much he'd pay. Brian said, 'No, we're the Bowl Guys, so you give

them to us.' The guy said, 'Are you freakin' kidding me? Get a job, you loser.'

"Brian came back and said, 'This might be a little harder than we expected.'"

Fifteen minutes later, a man heard the friends telling the story outside of Yankee Stadium. He handed them two tickets. It was Scott Paterno, the son of late Nittany Lions coach Joe Paterno.

"We sat in the first row behind the Penn State bench," Dixon said.

The friends wake up on game day without declaring rooting interests. The loser of the previous year's game makes a choice based on the point spread in the local paper. Then it's a mad rush to merchandise stands as the two buy up hats, shirts and gobs of memorabilia for their opposing teams.

Dixon built a big advantage before losing six of the last seven. Hall holds a precarious 18-17 edge in the loser-buys-food-and-drinks competition heading into today's Wyoming-BYU matchup at Qualcomm Stadium.

The "Skin to Win Game" still causes Dixon to shake his head.

Bowling Green roared to a 28-3 halftime lead at the 1992 Las Vegas Bowl before Nevada, Hall's pick, roared back. Dixon laughed as he saw Hall shirtless among the bare-chested throng in the opposing stands in the second half.

Nevada briefly took a lead, but fell 35-34. The line, though, was a bet-salvaging 2½ points.

"Tom and his skin-to-win buds were celebrating all night," Dixon said.

The men rank bowls — the 1985 Holiday is No. 4 — along with bartenders on their website, www.Bowl-Guys.com. The second list, obviously, is a calculated plan to land free drinks. As a backup, they created "Bowl Guys" pins that they trade.

"We figured 75 cents for a \$5 beer was a pretty good deal," Hall said.
